Maintenance Update

It is that time of year again, when our lawns test our patience; some lawns are green already, but others are hardly green at all. Let me see if I can be of help with this issue.

It may surprise you to learn that 99% of the lawns in Landfall are warm season grasses. Without boring you too much, warm season grasses that need a combination of day time highs and night time lows of 150 degrees before they start to grow aggressively. When this occurs on a regular basis, the soil temperature should reach about 70 degrees, which is the key. This is why you will notice lawns that are in full sun always green up first. Simply put, it is a lot warmer in the sun than it is in the shade. I always like to explain to people that their lawns in Landfall will usually be at its best around July 4th.

Wilmington is located in the transition zone. This simply means we are too far north to grow warm season grasses year round and too far south to grow cool season grasses year round. To me, the transition zone is the most difficult place I have ever grown turf grass. Between the many different diseases, insects and weeds that call this area home, a real challenge is presented. This is difficult, but not impossible; which is why continuing education and working closely with NC State

University staff is so important. Today's products are constantly being removed from the shelf and replaced with new and more environmentally friendly ones.

So, to sum it up: please do not let a landscaper tell you growing grass is easy. If they do, you might want to think twice before you hand over your hard-earned money.

Over the next few weeks Vector control will be in Landfall spraying our nature trails for mosquitoes. Our counts this year are extremely high and we are working closely with the county to get the best control on the mosquitoes that we can.

I would like to once again thank you for your continued support of the LAS and LOS programs. We are extremely busy and doing our very best to complete work orders as quickly as possible. I assure you that we will give each and every one of you our fullest attention. I will not bring in untrained temporary workers to speed up our lead times or allow for the quality of our work to diminish. Each and every one of you deserves our very best work and that is exactly what I will deliver.

Once again thank you and I wish all of you a very safe and enjoyable summer.

IMPORTANT COMMUNITY REMINDERS

Upcoming Landfall Inspection Reminder

Landfall COA performs an annual (from the street) survey of the entire Landfall community. This year, the survey will be conducted in early June. Please take time to address areas of your homesite that may need maintenance. Make sure that siding, foundations, front stairs and walkways are clean and free of mildew, discoloration or damage. Inspect trim around doors and windows, garage doors, rooflines and porches to make sure there are no areas of peeling paint, wood rot or damage. Inspect the condition of paint on trim, shutters, front doors and railings and apply fresh paint if it is needed. Please pay special attention to landscaping; making sure that lawns are mowed, overgrown areas are cleaned up, replace any dead plantings, remove any weeds from landscape beds and apply fresh mulch or pine straw in planting beds if it is needed.

For bare areas in lawns, please make decisions for how these will be addressed. Now is the perfect time to consider new sod, stonework, groundcovers or perhaps converting bare areas into new landscaping beds with attractive plants and shrubs. Please remember to obtain prior ARC approval for changes and modifications to homes and landscapes.

Golf Course Safety

The Country Club of Landfall proposed the following reminder be disseminated to all Landfall residents periodically. As you know, CCL is a private club and establishes rules for its property's access and use. It should be noted that none of the COA dues are given to CCL for maintenance of CCL facilities. Please observe this rule.

Landfall residents, please be aware that the property owned by the Country Club of Landfall is only to be used by members and their accompanied guests. Club property includes all facilities, golf courses and cart paths.

The golf course, in particular, is for use by those playing golf. Any other use during golfing hours would be in violation of this policy. When the course is not open for play, CCL members and accompanied guests are permitted to use the paths for recreational activities such as walking or cycling. Nonmembers are not permitted on the course or paths at any time.

Country Club of Landfall is not responsible for any damage or injury to you or your property in violation of this policy. For safety reasons, during golfing hours anyone other than registered golfers will be asked to leave the course.

Summer Boating & Water Safety

As the hot weather gets closer, many of us will take to the water of some sort whether it be a pool, lake or beach for fun. No matter what your choice, you should always be very careful and follow general water safety rules.

Before going out on the water, make sure someone knows where you are going and that you have a way of communicating. Always check the local weather conditions. If you notice darkening clouds, rough changing winds or a sudden drop in temperature, get out of the water as soon as you can and seek shelter.

Proper boating safety includes knowing how to swim. Make sure that you have proper life jackets and/or flotation devices. Also be sure before going out on your boat that you have all of the required safety gear and equipment.

One of my biggest safety concerns is avoiding alcohol.

Drinking alcohol not only affects you but could also affect the people surrounding you! As I mentioned before, these are only a few boating safety highlights.

Rip currents are a dangerous beach hazard. If you do get caught in a rip current, the best thing you can do is stay calm and not fight the current. Do NOT try to swim directly into shore. Swim along the shoreline until you escape the currant's pull. When free from the pull of the current, swim at an angle away from the current toward shore.

Wherever you are going, they may have their own rules, please follow them! There are several companies that offer a boating safety course, one being the US Coast Guard. If you are new to boating or if you have been doing it for years, this course is great for everyone, even as a refresher.

CERT SpringFest

Once every two years, the Landfall Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) has SpringFest to raise operating funds, introduce First Responders to the community and emphasize safety for our residents. We arrange annual CPR and First Aid courses with over 400 people trained!

Saturday, April 22nd turned out to be a beautiful day for the 2017 Landfall CERT SpringFest and Car Show. The day had something for everyone: amazing cars to look at, a bicycle rodeo for the kids, raffle prizes throughout the day, document shredding, recycling of electronics and hazardous materials, and great food.

The Amigo Car Club of Landfall organized the car show and The Rusty Bumpers Band provided an amazing musical back drop for the show with 3 hours of classic rock. The best in show award was renamed the Peter Burr Award in memory of CERT's own Peter Burr (who passed away in 2016) who was an avid car buff. This year's award went to Russell Gosnell for his 1961 Red Mercedes 190 SL chosen by Karen Burr.

The Cape Fear Cyclists set up a bicycle rodeo for the children to teach them the rules of the road and riding safety with assistance from Switchin Gears, a local non-profit that teaches kids how to do safety inspections and repair their own bikes. They were thrilled to receive a dozen bike donations during the day that they will repair, recycle and give to a deserving person in need of transportation.

The Wilmington Police Department , NHRMC-EMS bike unit as well as the New Hanover County Sheriff's office bike unit were in attendance to give riding advice as well as some great giveaways to everyone.

A raffle was held with dinner for 8 at CCL as first prize, 4 hours yard work by the COA (second prize) and both CPR and First Aid courses – a priceless gift!

Joe Tomlinson was the grand prize winner of dinner for 8 at CCL working with the chef to create a menu.

Merchant Marine Memorial Unveiled on National Maritime Day

As we celebrate the 4th of July Holiday, a member of our community is celebrating the success of a project which pays tribute to Merchant Marine veterans. Congress created National Maritime Day in 1933, to be on May 22nd of each year. This day has been observed in every port city since that time. Every major seaport in the United States has a memorial of some kind for the American Merchant Mariners, except Wilmington. Wilmington has celebrated the National Maritime Day lavishly every year, but there has never been a memorial monument to pay tribute. Captain Henry Helgesen, Master Mariner, retired, U.S. Coast Guard, is a Landfall resident who organized a committee of volunteers to change that.

During the celebration in May 2015, Captain Helgesen

and a group of other attendees, including veterans as well as a number of recent graduates from the Maritime Academy began to discuss the lack of memorial in Wilmington. Together, this group of dedicated volunteers organized, gathered funds and in less than a year was able to commission a beautiful monument to be placed in Wilmington along the river walk.

The memorial was unveiled at a ceremony in downtown Wilmington on May 22nd. The monument is 9 feet tall and made of stunning black granite. The monument was made at a granite company in Mount Airy, NC and is very unique. Now the Port City can enjoy a Memorial Monument which honors the American Merchant Mariners who have served the nation since 1775. Next time you are near the river walk, check it out!

U.S. Flag Etiquette

Displaying the United States Flag

When the flag is displayed from a staff projecting from a window, balcony, or a building, the union should be at the peak of the staff unless the flag is at half staff.

When it is displayed from the same flagpole with another flag - of a state, community, society or Scout unit - the flag of the United States must always be at the top except that the church pennant may be flown above the flag during church services for Navy personnel when conducted by a Naval chaplain on a ship at sea.

When flown with flags of states, communities, or societies on separate flag poles which are of the same height and in a straight line, the flag of the United States is always placed in the position of honor - to its own right.

- The other flags may be smaller, but none may be larger.
- No other flag ever should be placed above it.
- The flag of the United States is always the first flag raised and the last to be lowered.

When displaying the flag against a wall, vertically or horizontally, the flag's union (stars) should be at the top, to the flag's own right, and to the observer's left.

Raising and Lowering the Flag

The flag should be raised briskly and lowered slowly and ceremoniously. Ordinarily it should be displayed only between sunrise and sunset. It should be illuminated if displayed at night.

The flag of the United States of America is saluted as it is hoisted and lowered. The salute is held until the flag is unsnapped from the halyard or through the last note of music, whichever is the longest.
