LANDFALL COA BOARD CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

The Annual Meeting of the Landfall Council of Associations was held on March 30 with approximately 250 residents in attendance. Slides discussed during the meeting are available on the landfall.org website. The agenda covered: a) the role that resident volunteers play b) presentations from our LCOA Staff leaders on 2022 accomplishments and financials and c) an active Q&A session.

We are fortunate to live in a great and beautiful community! Our good fortune is not built on happenstance, but rather on the long established practice of active engagement from resident volunteers in setting expectations and priorities which our professional staff use to administer the Associations day to day operations. We have sixty (60) residents serving on

either the Board, or one of seven (7) committees. Each volunteer serves a three year term and every March we hold elections for exiting Board members and replace outgoing committee members through our Nominating Committee interview process. There is additional detail on the 2023 Board and Committee make-up in this newsletter, but I would like to take a moment to recognize some key individuals. Steve Bruni, Phil Ley and Randy Marshall are outgoing Chairs of the Nominating, Covenants & Security and Architectural Review Committees respectively and we are very appreciative for their leadership. Bill Hamlet has been the COA Board Chair for the past two years. We want to recognize him for his leadership and long term service to the

Landfall community! Finally, a warm welcome to Kelly Garnett, newly elected District 1 representative on the Board.

Our Staff leaders, Roxanne Powell, Charles Carr and Steve Hughes provided very positive reviews of our operations, results and 2023 priorities. Highlights from their presentations would begin with the financial strength of the Association. Our financial strength allowed the Board to hold the homeowner assessment increase to five percent (5%) when, during this period of high inflation, a majority of associations across the country were up eight to ten percent.

Landfall has purchased a new software system to manage gate and security activity that will improve traffic control and security within the community.

Software will also be purchased to improve accounting and maintenance processes. To be implemented over the course of 2023, homeowners will have the ability to make on-line payments and the association will benefit from cycle time improvements in billing and accounts receivable.

Staff worked with Buildings & Grounds to locate, plan and build our new Community Gardens and 77 residents have begun using that amenity.

Staff continues to be engaged with the City in development projects around Landfall and they do a terrific job of keeping residents informed through their "When We Know You'll Know" Communications."

Staff did an excellent job of working through negotiations with our waste carrier to return back door service to residents.

The Architectural Review Committee continues to be very active overseeing the construction of 32 new homes, installation of 34 swimming pools and meeting with 77 owners for on site reviews and discussions.

Following the presentations, the Q&A discussion covered some of the following topics:

- a) Sidewalk study: An email update on the current state of this subject was sent the week of April 10.
- b) Fiber optic network: Board has held initial meetings with Spectrum and

Cloudwyze to discuss building a fiber optic network in Landfall. Suggestions from the attender for the Board to consider:

- a) improved street lighting, more visible signage
- b) homeowners with dogs would like a location for off leash activity
- c) improvements to trail network

The Board and Staff will discuss these suggestions and provide responses in the next Voice newsletter.

Thank you to everyone who attended the Annual Meeting and our deep appreciation to all current and previous volunteers for helping to make this such a great place to live!

Finance Report

The February 2023 financial statements have been approved by the Board of Directors. Financial results as of February 2023 are as follows:

YTD Revenues \$2,106,000
YTD Expenses \$1,615,000
YTD CIF Contributions \$372,000
YTD Net Income \$119,000

The Capital Improvement Fund (CIF) ended February at \$3,432,000 and is estimated to end the year 2023 at \$3,052,000. The 2022 audit is currently underway and the final audited financial statements should be available on the website by the beginning of June 2023. Please note that the Landfall COA semi-annual assessments will be invoiced by May 26, 2023. When remitting payment by check for the Landfall COA semi-annual assessments, please do not include any other association's assessments with Landfall COA as these assessments need to be deposited into separate bank accounts. Also, please ensure that your check is made payable to Landfall COA and includes the correct property address and invoice number.

As a reminder, Wall Recycling collects our residents' trash on Thursdays and Fridays unless otherwise announced. On the days of collection, cans should be returned to screened areas. If you experience issues with this process, please contact Wall Recycling to get this addressed right away.

Additionally, we have had an increased number of complaints about children ringing doorbells and then running away. While this may seem harmless, it is very annoying not to mention unnerving for someone that lives alone. Parents, please be mindful and speak with your children so they may pass it on to their friends.

Membership in the Garden is open to all Landfall residents. For a first year fee of \$100, a raised bed will be built, and organic mulch will be provided. Hose attachments are available with well water provided at no cost. Most of the area gets full to partial sun, and there are also portions of shaded ground for plants that do

not like the heat. After the first year of membership, you may renew for two more years for only \$50 per year.
